Fall Greetings from Rev. Susan Mattinson

Dear Friends,

This is my first newsletter greeting to you as your new minister! Rest assured that I have also not missed the irony of this, my first church, being First Church. I am both delighted and a little daunted to be entering into this journey with you.

A Presbyterian professor (who shall remain nameless) once told a fellow student of mine, "If you want to experience what it's like to apply for a ministry position in the Presbyterian Church, try online dating". Prospective ministers create documents that are part resume and part personality profile and churches do the same. Church office helps provide ministers with church profiles and churches with minister profiles. Then, if a profile looks good, the church and minister meet in person and get to know one another. The whole process is prayerful discernment, with both sides wondering: Would we be a good fit? What might be the challenges? Will they understand me and respect me? What if they don't like me? And so on. Finally a decision is made, vows are taken in a service of Induction, and the relationship officially begins. I know—it's a little weird, but my prof's analogy seems pretty accurate.

We are still early in our relationship, you and me. It is exhilarating and fun, shiny and new, and we need to enjoy this part of the journey for what it is. But my hope is that when we've settled down, when the newness starts to wear off—when I have cranky days and you have cranky days and we both don't have the energy to cover it up like we used to—that we'll still remember what God has called us to do: "...to put our faith into action through mission, education, community outreach, and personal and financial support both at home and abroad." I know that as we open ourselves to the Spirit's leading, God absolutely can and WILL lead our church to do great things in His name.

To the Session and Congregation of First, Thunder Bay


Dear friends.

Rules for being human

The unexamined life is not worth living. (Socrates)

When I arrived in Sarawak on the island of Borneo to teach at the tender age of twenty-seven, I was emerging from a narrow home life and society that discouraged me to think for myself or about myself. Conformity was the normal. Lacking confidence, I was overly defensive. I covered up this insecurity by a whirlwind of unproductive and unsatisfying activity. This psychological imprisonment made me very unsure of my motives. I had ill-defined goals. Rigid in my thinking, narrow in religious philosophy and overly critical of anything or anyone that threatened my quaking self-image, I had been imprisoned in my thoughts.

Separated from a culture in which I grew up, with familiar props withdrawn, I was on my own. The shock of a new culture, a feeling of futility, personality clashes and loneliness brought me to a point of desperation and isolation. Gradually becoming aware of my inadequacies and failures as a human being I saw the light through this dark forest. Encouraged by the warmth and approval of the students I had taught in that far-off jungle land, I had to call upon my own resources and creativity in making my own textbooks and other resources not readily available. I had more leisure time to publish a long dreamed-about songbook. Exposure to various faiths helped me examine my own religious background and involvement with various cultures further broadened my horizons increased my tolerance level. A new shock, in the form of marriage brought me even more need to confront myself. Willa and I grappled many perplexing issues with a degree of openness. I developed what I thought was a more satisfying style of communication. I learned to build a relationship that gave me confidence to take a better look at myself to examine my limitations and to realise I had a great potential. My newly emerging confidence was climaxed by my being accepted for a Master's degree after an unimpressive academic record up to that time.

How did I manifest and profit from this self-awareness? My relationships with people became more confident and trusting. As I became less defensive and more open, I was able to share of myself with others, able to accept their good and bad points with more generosity of spirit. As I became more flexible in my thinking, I became more inquisitive, questioning and broadening my conformist standards. I developed a sense of purpose. I felt a desire to improve my education. Vitality and happiness increased, fear of the unknown ahead decreased. It was the beginning of the long road of self-discovery That was over forty years ago. And of today? All of us need to continually re-examine ourselves each step of our journey. It takes a whole lifetime to know ourselves, let alone others.

When Jimmy Carter was elected president, the catchword was that he was the first born-again Christian to be president. While Carter still acknowledges his strong spirituality, he believes the tag *born-again* is a cliché that's a bit overused. At birth, it is generally acknowledged we have a *clean slate*, no mess-ups in our lives. After birth we learn to be good and we learn to be not so good. Knowing ourselves is a long-term struggle. We need to be born again when we wake up each morning. Each day starts with a new slate.

Dr. Cherie Carter-Scott has penned from her book If Life is a Game, These are the Rules the following guidelines for our daily existence:

- 1. You will receive a body. You may like it or hate it, but it's yours to keep for the entire period.
- 2. You will learn lessons. You are enrolled in a full-time informal school called, life.
- 3. There are no mistakes, only lessons. Growth is a process of trial, error, and experimentation. The *failed* experiments are as much a part of the process as the experiments that ultimately *work*.
- 4. Lessons are repeated until they are learned. A lesson will be presented to you in various forms until you have learned it. When you have learned it, you can go on to the next lesson.
- 5. Learning lessons does not end. There's no part of life that doesn't contain its lessons. If you're alive, that means there are still lessons to be learned.
- 6. There is no better a place than here. When your there has become a here, you will simply obtain another there that will again look better than here.
- 7. Other people are merely mirrors of you. You cannot love or hate something about another person unless it reflects to you something you love or hate about yourself.
- 8. What you make of your life is up to you. You have all the tools & resources you need. What you do with them is up to you. The choice is yours.
- 9. Your answers lie within you. The answers to life's questions lie within you. All you need to do is look, listen, and trust.
- 10. You will forget all this at birth. Somewhere along your journey from the spiritual world to the physical one, you simply forgot These Rules. The Ten Rules are universal truths that apply to us all. When we lose our way, we must think upon these rules, having faith in the strength of our spirit

Helen Keller once said: Life is a succession of lessons which must be lived to be understood.
